## FROM THE DIRECTOR

As you read this, the fall semester will be well underway. However, I wish to welcome back our returning students for school year 2007 – 2008 and add a most warm welcome to our new students in the Division of Part-Time Studies. This school year will begin a year of celebration of part-time, adult education at Villanova. Commencing in 1918, classes were offered for adult students on a part-time basis and in that same year summer session programs were inaugurated. During calendar year 2008, the part-time and continuing studies offices will hold a series of events to recognize 90 years of part-time studies at Villanova. We are planning to produce a publication that will highlight the history of part-time studies, students, present and past, academic programs and faculty. There will be events throughout the year that will involve students, alumni and the University community. Be sure to look for information on our Web site as we approach January, 2008 and throughout the year.

In spring 2008, Villanova will also recognize 50 years of membership in Alpha Sigma Lambda, the national honor society for adult students. Villanova's Mu chapter of ASL was established on February 6, 1958. Since that time it has been an active chapter of ASL and has recognized outstanding adult students with induction into ASL each year. Alpha Sigma Lambda is the only academic honor society in the United States dedicated exclusively to the recognition of the adult learner.

On a few administrative notes, I would like to emphasize the importance of the "prospective graduate form" as you approach your last semester at Villanova. This form may be found on our part time web site or in Vasey 107. It should be completed and submitted to Ms. Marie McHale in Vasey 107 prior to starting your last semester at Villanova. Submission of this form informs us that you are approaching graduation and prompts a review of your progress so that any discrepancies in your degree audit may be resolved prior to your last semester, thereby avoiding any delays in your graduation. Additionally, the way you submit your name on this form, i.e. middle initial or spell out your middle name, is the way the registrar will place your name on your diploma. While we do track our students' progress, submission of this form in advance will avoid any delays in graduation.

Registration for the spring semester will begin on October 30, 2007. Be sure to contact your academic advisor for your spring registration PIN number if you plan to register online in NOVASIS. You can always register in person in Vasey 107 or by sending a fax to our office (610.519.7910) however, the fastest way is to register is online.

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## CAREER CORNER

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### Rethinking the Nine-to-Five Career

The image of employees chained to their desks is no longer relevant in today's world of flexible work arrangements. In fact, in the 2006 Benefits Survey by the Society for Human Resource Management, 57 percent of human resource professionals reported that their organizations offered flextime options, according to a careerbuilder.com article. Some examples of flexible work arrangements include: flextime, telecommuting, a compressed work week, job sharing and results- or goal-oriented work. In flextime arrangements, employees set their own hours within the limits set by their employers. A telecommuting employee does not work from the office, but rather from home or another non-office setting. By working a compressed work week, employees can work longer hours per day, thereby completing their work week in fewer days. In job sharing, two or more employees share one job and split the responsibilities as well as the work days. When employees do results- or goal-oriented work, they do not have set hours, but instead are expected to complete specific projects in a specified length of time.

One of the most popular choices in flexible work arrangements is telecommuting, more popularly referred to as "working from home." According to an article on careerbuilder.com, the International Telework Association & Council found that "about 20 million Americans—nearly 10 percent of working adults—now telecommute at least one day per month." There are both benefits and downsides to this flexible option. One benefit is that employees can have more family time. They also spend less time commuting, less money on transportation and wardrobe, and can work at their own peak hours of productivity. One downside to telecommuting is that face time with the employer is limited, or even

eliminated. This can make getting noticed for a promotion or recognition much more challenging. Employees who telecommute must also stay in touch with colleagues so that they can know what is going on in the office, as well as to safeguard against anyone taking credit for their work. An external downside to telecommuting is the interruptions an employee may sustain from family or friends who see the new situation as free time, rather than work time. Telecommuting is a great idea for employees who thrive in creative, self-motivating environments, but less of an ideal option for people who need to interact with others or need outside motivation in order to excel.

Careerbuilder.com also profiled five high profile companies that offer flexible work arrangements. For example, Sun Microsystems, Inc. employees participate in the company's "Open Work" program, which gives them the option to work flexible hours and off-site. Seventy percent of employees at KPMG LLP work flexible hours. Their other flexible offerings include compressed work weeks and shorter summer hours on Fridays. At Best Buy Co., Inc., employees have a goal-oriented work environment with no fixed workday hours, as long as they achieve set results. About half of the employees at PNC Financial Services Group, Inc., participate in flexible work arrangements, including job sharing, telecommuting and compressed work weeks. More than 40 percent of employees do the same at PricewaterhouseCoopers.

Employees who are uncertain of their company's policy on flexible work arrangements should inquire with their human resources department. Many people would be surprised to learn how willing their company is to work around their needs.

**Martin Andzulis** is a senior Information Systems student in Villanova's Part-Time Studies program. He has been working full time for a large electrical utility in the Geospatial Information Systems department for the past eight years. He began his career there as a QC Technician and worked through the ranks to his current role as Applications Business Analyst IV. His current responsibilities include maintaining the production environment and leading a company wide software and data migration effort. The classes he has taken have often provided input into his daily decisions. Andzulis remarked, "Villanova's experienced professors provided insight on best practices and industry standards, in some cases this has prevented major headaches from arising later in the project".

Outside of work and education, Andzulis enjoys skateboarding, motorcycles and travel. In March 2007 he participated in the Model UN team that visited Cairo, Egypt to represent the University. Attending the conference were 19 undergraduate, graduate and part-time students, along with Professor Marwan Kreidie. Andzulis was able to experience new culture and friendship with Villanova and American

University in Cairo students all while earning three credits towards his degree.

Prior to Villanova, Andzulis obtained his associates degree from Penn State in Mechanical Engineering along with a few professional certifications in networking and applications. Inspired by friends and family, he began looking at local part-time programs. "My brother received his MBA here, my sister, her Master of Science in Human Resource Management. Both spoke very highly of Villanova and the caliber of education and professors, so my choice was clear," said Andzulis.

In May, 2006 he was inducted in Alpha Sigma Lambda Honor Society and has made the Dean's list the past several semesters.

Andzulis is looking forward to completing his degree in spring 2008, but doubts he will ever quit learning. He has already started looking into graduate programs, but may take a break to pursue other activities. "I've always wanted to learn to fly, so I may try and get my pilot's license before I pursue an advanced degree."

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## CONTINUING STUDIES UPDATE

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### Human Resource Management Program Ranked First in Nation

On July 10, 2007, the Society for Human Resource Management (SHRM), the largest human resources professional association in the world, recognized the Villanova University Office of Continuing Studies as the number one provider of its SHRM Learning System course for 2006.

This distinction, which places the University as the first among the top 20 institutions by enrollment, has belonged to the University several times since the program's inception in 1992. Last year, with 1,060 students, Villanova University had almost double the number of students enrolled with the second highest provider. There are 240 colleges and universities, and over 10,000 students involved in the Learning System course annually.

Villanova University was one of the first colleges and universities that became involved with SHRM, following the collaboration between Robert Stokes, Ed.D., assistant vice president of Academic Affairs for Part-Time and Continuing Studies, and Scott Miller, current president and CEO of the Holmes Corporation and representative of the SHRM account at the time. According to Sherrie Thuot, manager of educational products at SHRM, through this partnership, the University gains national exposure and co-branding with the world's largest human resources association, in addition to the benefits of access to a comprehensive learning system, an online resource center, and experts in the industry.

The University offers two SHRM-affiliated, in-classroom courses in human resource management through Continuing Studies. One course is focused on preparation for the Human Resource Certification Institute's (HRCI) national examinations for the Professional in Human Resources (PHR) or Senior Professional in Human Resources (SPHR) certification. Instructor-led use of the SHRM Learning System has been linked with higher pass rates on the HRCI exams. This class is offered on the University campus, but also in locations throughout the Greater Philadelphia Area.

The other course, Essentials of Human Resource Management, introduces students to the basic skills and concepts necessary in the field of human resource management. Both courses are non-credit.

Villanova University also offers a set of online courses, incorporating the SHRM Learning System, for a Master Certificate in Human Resource Management. These courses are available online at [www.villanovau.com](http://www.villanovau.com). In addition to in classroom and online courses Villanova University also offers on-site corporate classes and training programs.

These examples of accessibility and corporate outreach, in addition to strong relationships with local SHRM chapters, has led Tom Schmelz of the Holmes Corporation to refer to Villanova University's Human Resource Management program as "number one, as far as enrollment, quality of education, and a great online program," and to its relationship with SHRM as "the model we want to follow with all of our other associations."

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## FOCUS ON FACULTY: MATTHEW R. KERBEL, PH.D.

**Matthew R. Kerbel, Ph.D.**, is professor of political science at Villanova University. He is the author of five books, including *If It Bleeds, It Leads: An Anatomy of Television News*, and *Remote and Controlled: Media Politics in a Cynical Age*, as well as numerous essays and articles on politics, power, and the mass media. A graduate of the University of Michigan, Dr. Kerbel traces his interest in the media to his previous work as a television newswriter for Public Broadcasting in New York, and as a radio news reporter. His writing has been published in *The Hill* newspaper in Washington, DC, and he has appeared on National Public Radio, C-SPAN's Book TV, and scores of national and regional radio and television news and talk programs.

Dr. Kerbel says, "What I enjoy most about teaching FastForward courses is the opportunity to teach older students, who bring a maturity and sense of purpose to the classroom. And, I appreciate their perspective on the material I teach, which has a strong applied component that benefits from the perspective that life experience brings."

Dr. Kerbel is currently teaching a FastForward course on the presidency and has taught FastForward classes in political communication.
