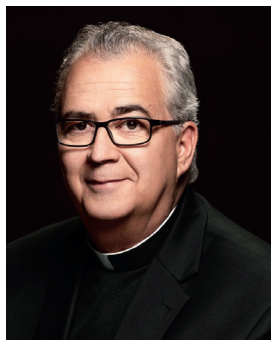

THE AUGUSTINIAN TRADITION

“Become what you are not yet.”
—St. Augustine



ST. AUGUSTINE

When we talk about embodying our mission, we often start with a name you’ll see and hear a lot at Villanova: St. Augustine (pronounced Au-GUS-tin). He and his journey are at the center of the University’s mission. Born in 354 in present-day North Africa, Augustine grew to be a gifted teacher and persuasive speaker. His upwardly mobile career path led him to Milan to become that imperial city’s official orator.

Along the way, Augustine had wrestled with spiritual questions. What was his purpose in life? Did his ambitions align with his values? How could a loving God allow evil to exist? He explored various religions, but none satisfied his hunger for truth. Thus, his mind and restless heart were primed for a series of events and encounters in Milan that led to his conversion experience.

Augustine would go on to be baptized Catholic and become a priest, a bishop and one of the greatest influencers in the history of Western Christianity.

THE AUGUSTINIAN ORDER

The Augustinian Order, established in 1244, came to Philadelphia in 1796 and founded Villanova University in 1842. The friars chose St. Thomas of Villanova—known as “the father of the poor”—as their patron saint. Today, the Augustinians remain a crucial part of Villanova, maintaining a constant presence in University leadership, in and out of the classroom, and in ministry positions across all areas of campus.

In May 2025, Villanovans across the globe celebrated the installation of **Pope Leo XIV**, the first Augustinian pope and the first from the United States, and a **1977 graduate of Villanova University!**

THE AUGUSTINE AND CULTURE SEMINAR

The Augustine and Culture Seminar (ACS) is a two-semester, first-year Humanities seminar course rooted in the Augustinian and Catholic intellectual traditions that prepares all students for success at Villanova and beyond.

ACS is an integral and required component of the first-year student experience. In these courses, students sharpen practical and necessary skills of careful reading, critical thinking and clear writing as they make a humanistic inquiry into Augustine’s relationship with the ancient and modern worlds—and ask, as Augustine did again and again, “Who am I?”





PARENT AND FAMILY RELATIONS

The Office of Parent and Family Relations in the Division of Student Life serves as a hub of information and a source of connection for Villanova University parents and families. We partner with families to facilitate proactive communication and share resources so that you may support the intellectual, spiritual and personal growth of your Villanovan. Together, we will help your Wildcat grow toward independence and be better prepared to navigate new experiences, advocate for themselves and make important decisions.

Families are encouraged to use the Villanova website to search for information on our Parent and Family web pages, connect via Instagram and attend events—both online and in person. Families should contact Parent and Family Relations with questions about resources for yourself or your Villanovan, or if they have a concern about an issue and aren't sure where to start.

HOW WILL THE UNIVERSITY COMMUNICATE WITH PARENTS AND FAMILIES?

One big change from high school to college is the way in which parents and family members receive information. Villanova communicates with families throughout the year regarding certain events and some news items. Otherwise, due to federal regulations and to maintain student privacy, all communication will go to your Villanovan, and they are encouraged to share and discuss with you.

Through our monthly Parent and Family Connection e-newsletter and social media, families learn more about campus resources, student opportunities and other important information. You may receive emails directly from the University when necessary. We'll also host occasional webinars throughout the year in which family members can learn more about Move-In Day, Orientation and the housing selection process. THE FIRST YEAR EXPERIENCE

Brand-new Villanovans hit the ground running! Our immersive, four-day New Student Orientation Program kicks off immediately before the start of classes and

offers an experience of community and belonging through intentional programming. Students will learn about campus resources, talk about common first-year concerns and connect with their peers through presentations and small group conversations. They'll explore ways to get involved and lean into the challenges of campus life, accompanied by the many offices and departments that are here to help them throughout their Villanova experience.

New Student Orientation for the Class of 2030 begins with Move-In Day on Wednesday, Aug. 19. Opening Day for students and family members—which includes our University Welcome, meetings with Orientation Counselors, Opening Mass and much more—takes place on Thursday, Aug. 20. Families will depart campus, and Orientation will continue for students through Sunday, Aug. 23.

The Office of First Year Experience plans and executes the New Student Orientation program on behalf of the Division of Student Life, a resource that's committed to helping your student navigate every aspect of their "new home." Even after Orientation concludes, Student Life will be available to assist your student with any issue—from the normal life issues that affect nearly every student, to more serious situations. “This is what we love in our friends: to talk and laugh together, to do favors for one another, to read pleasant books together, to joke and to be serious with each other, to disagree but without bitterness, as a person might disagree with himself, to have most conversations without any disagreement, to teach one another or to learn from one another, to long for those who are absent with impatience, to welcome those who come with joy.”

Villanova University includes two suburban campuses in close proximity to each other. The Villanova Campus is located on Lancaster Avenue in Villanova, Pa., while the Cabrini Campus is located just two miles away on King of Prussia Road in Radnor.

First-year students will be housed in one of the 17 traditional residence halls on the Villanova Campus. Next year, as a sophomore, your student will have the opportunity to select housing from among many options on the Villanova Campus or the Cabrini Campus. For most students, living at college is a great experience, and students flourish with the opportunities they find on campus. This is likely the first time they are living on their own, with peers rather than with their loved ones. Most students are ready for this kind of living, and they thrive on it.

As parents and guardians, you’ll probably hear about roommate(s) and friendships, as well as new interests and activities that can develop quickly. Students form a close community as they support each other and learn together. Friend groups evolve throughout the college years.

Living together can be an intense experience with some emotional ups and downs. When there are problems, parents and guardians often hear about them. Remember that working out issues in residential living is part of the learning experience! Encourage your Villanovan to address issues sooner than later by seeking out the campus resources designed to help them manage challenging situations.

THE HOUSING APPLICATION

Students planning to live on campus were asked to complete a Housing Application in the spring. Later this summer, they’ll receive an email from the Office for Residence Life containing details about their residence hall, their room and their roommate(s). Encourage your student to get in touch with their roommate(s) to discuss what each will bring to Move-In Day in August.

Your Villanovan’s residence hall will be supervised by a Resident Assistant (RA), an upper-class student who lives in the building who can help students find connections on campus and build community in the halls. Villanova chooses RAs through a comprehensive selection process and provides them with extensive training. The RA serves as friend, adviser and problem-solver, and generally acts as the University’s front-line representative on everything from maintenance issues to health and safety.



HOW LONG CAN MY STUDENT LIVE ON CAMPUS?

Villanovans who are admitted as residential students are guaranteed three consecutive years of on-campus housing. Residence Life has information available for students who wish to live off-campus; visit villanova.edu/offcampus for more information.

LOOKING AHEAD

In the Spring semester, your student will select sophomore year housing from among myriad options on the Villanova and Cabrini campuses. Encourage your student to keep an eye on their email for information about the process. The Office for Residence Life and the Office of Parent and Family Relations will host events and webinars to keep students and families up-to-date!

COMMON RESIDENTIAL QUESTIONS

Villanova's Office for Residence Life is staffed by professionals trained to handle the wide array of situations that can arise among residential students. Many of these professionals live on the Villanova or Cabrini campus and are on-call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, to help address:

- Roommate conflicts
- Facilities concerns
- Issues with homesickness
- Mental or physical health concerns
- Housing during University breaks
- Personal safety
- Fire safety
- Other concerns

We encourage students to utilize the services and counsel provided by Resident Assistants, Area Coordinators, Graduate Resident Ministers, Peer Ministers and student support personnel. Often, conflicts and other concerns can be addressed quickly and comprehensively. While your first inclination may be to call the University to try to solve a problem for your student, we suggest you allow your student to take the first step by reaching out to staff.



DINING

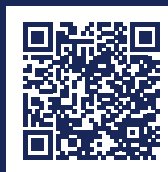
Villanova's Dining Services offers a range of options for breakfast, lunch, dinner and everything in between! There are nearly 30 eateries available on the Villanova and Cabrini campuses. Options include à la carte, quick service and all-you-care-to-eat dining establishments. Students can also grab meals and snacks at any of the several Holy

Grounds coffee shops across campus, or at the Wawa convenience store located in the Connelly Center on the Villanova Campus. Dining Services also hosts a variety of fun scheduled and pop-up events throughout the year, encouraging students to try new foods and learn to cook their own healthy, delicious meals.

Residential students can choose from a variety of flexible meal plans; your student selected their first-year plan through their Housing Portal earlier this summer and will have the opportunity to make changes to it during the year if necessary.



The Spokin app has ranked Villanova among the nation's most allergy-friendly colleges, highlighting the University's clear food labeling, designated allergy-free stations and comprehensive allergy policy. Students with food allergies are encouraged to reach out to Dining Services to discuss allergies or special dietary needs; in addition, our app helps students select and order food at any of our campus establishments.

STUDENT MAIL AND PACKAGES

Resident students are assigned a VU Box number that will remain the same for as long as they have housing on the Villanova or Cabrini campus. This box number will be sent out in late July and must be used on all mail and packages sent to campus. When your student's box number is sent to them, they'll receive instructions for mailing packages to the University for Move-In Day and for the remainder of the academic year.





LEARNING

As an Augustinian Catholic institution, Villanova University recognizes that important learning occurs through every aspect of a student's life. As a result, we seek to focus everything at Villanova, in one way or another, on creating or supporting student learning.

We encourage you to let your Villanovan take the lead when it comes to their academic journey. Students should be their own advocates when it comes to choosing their academic path, completing assignments, contacting professors, studying and managing conflict. This independence and self-support is an important part of your student's journey into adulthood.

CLASSES

Villanovans will take classes in buildings on both the Villanova and Cabrini campuses. Depending on their course of study, your student can expect to utilize our shuttle system to travel back and forth between campuses. In their first year, your Villanovan will receive a schedule from the Office of the Registrar that takes into account the amount of time it will take to travel between campuses. In future years, your student will schedule their own classes with the help of their academic adviser. Ultimately, your student will be responsible for ensuring that they arrive at their classes on time, no matter the location.

ACADEMIC ADVISING AND COURSE SCHEDULING

The Office of the Registrar will schedule the Fall 2026 semester of classes for most first-year students over the summer months. Prior to Orientation, each college will have assigned new students an academic adviser. If necessary, students can make changes to their Fall 2026 schedules after they arrive on campus and have an opportunity to meet with their adviser.

For the Spring 2027 semester and beyond, students will register for classes on their own via an online portal after a meeting with their academic adviser, who will help the student understand degree requirements and explore interests. Spring 2027 course registration will occur in October and November 2026, and Fall 2027 course registration will take place in March 2027.

Ultimately, fulfilling course requirements is the responsibility of the individual student. Students are encouraged to track and plan their academic progress toward degree completion with Degree Works, an online auditing tool for Villanovans that provides students with an academic roadmap that lays out their required courses, tracks their credits earned and updates their GPA status each semester.

GRADES

Students receive grades twice a semester: at midterm and at the end of the semester. Villanova does not mail grades home. Your Villanovan will have access to their grades and can share them with you if they choose to do so through Proxy Access.

WHAT IS PROXY ACCESS?

Proxy Access provides students the ability to grant permission to parents or guardians to view certain information (including grades). Visit villanova.edu/family to learn how your student can set up Proxy Access.

MAJORS AND CAREERS

Some students start their first year with a major, but most students follow a more general program their first year and then pick a major within their college during their sophomore year. Most first-year students won't be able to make a decision about a career until they are much further along in their academic journey.

When talking with your Villanovan about choosing a major, we suggest an open and honest conversation about their career goals, professional options, personal interests and academic strengths. Encourage your student to pursue a major that interests them.

TRANSFERRING BETWEEN COLLEGES

Some students may wish to transfer from one of Villanova's colleges to another. Admission to another college is not guaranteed, and a student who transfers may need to take additional courses. In this case, some will choose to take courses in the summer in order to graduate with their class. When considering these options, students should meet with their advisers to ensure they will graduate on time.

ACADEMIC RESOURCES

Students have access to a range of free resources across the Villanova campuses.

- **PROFESSORS:** Villanova faculty members keep regular office hours during which students can meet with them, and professors are also available at other times by appointment.
- **LEARNING SUPPORT SERVICES:** Staff members offer classes and individual sessions on topics like time management, test-taking and studying. Students with learning disabilities, chronic debilitating illnesses or neurological disorders can find accommodations and dedicated programs here.
- **THE LEARNERS' STUDIO:** Offering peer tutors in 150+ courses from across academic colleges, The Learners' Studio provides one-on-one or small group (capped at five students) tutoring.
- **THE WRITING CENTER:** Experienced writing tutors are available by appointment and on a drop-in basis to review drafts and suggest strategies for approaching a problem.
- **THE MATH CENTER IN THE LEARNERS' STUDIO:** Tutors can help with the trickiest problems and offer help and support with homework and projects.
- **THE CENTER FOR SPEAKING AND PRESENTATION:** Students receive expert guidance from Communication graduate students on topics including managing speaking anxiety, audience analysis, visual aid design and more.
- **THE CENTER FOR ACCESS, SUCCESS AND ACHIEVEMENT (CASA):** CASA seeks to enrich the undergraduate learning experience of students who register with them by providing exceptional holistic support to enhance personal and professional development. CASA provides advocacy, advising, coaching, educating, programming, tutoring, networking and sustained partnerships.
- **THE OFFICE FOR ACCESS AND DISABILITY SERVICES (ADS):** Staff members ensure that qualified students with disabilities have equal access to educational opportunities by eliminating physical and educational barriers. ADS provides support services and accommodations to students with disabilities so they are able to participate freely and actively in all facets of University life.
- **FALVEY LIBRARY:** An extensive range of resources can be found here, and our professional library staff members are well-versed in helping students connect with what they need.

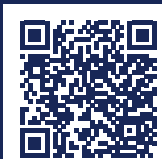
OUR MISSION IN ACTION

They also offer pastoral care and counsel, helping students deal with value conflicts, grief, spiritual discernment and other issues connected with faith and life.

SERVICE AND ADVOCACY

Augustine challenges us to advance as a community and grow in our ability to love by focusing on the common good and integrating social justice with advocacy, while being grounded in the dignity of humanity and all of creation. Within Mission and Ministry, there are three major centers where students can serve, learn and advocate in a supportive community.

The **St. Thomas of Villanova Center for the Common Good (CCG)** serves as the main hub for community service and engaged learning at Villanova. It collaborates with both local and global partners and advocates for systems that promote the common good.

The Center for Peace and Justice Education (CPJE) empowers students to think critically and engage in challenging but transformative discussions. It encourages students to confront institutions that render individuals vulnerable and to participate in efforts that uphold dignity for all. Additionally, the **Office for Sustainability** aligns Villanova's value-centered principles with environmental stewardship, promoting inclusivity among all members of the University and addressing all aspects of sustainability.

RETREATS

Throughout the year, Mission and Ministry retreats provide students with the opportunity to step back from their daily routines, reflect on their spirituality and values, share

stories and experience rest or gain a new perspective. A highlight for first-year students is the **First-Year Escape Retreat**, held off campus and designed to help incoming students connect with others in their class cohort.

As an Augustinian Catholic community, we see the worth and dignity of all people, of all faiths and backgrounds, and we find unity not in uniformity but in mutual respect and care—knowing that we learn best from and with each other. From worship to spiritual growth; to pastoral care and accompaniment of all backgrounds and faiths; to advocacy; to service; to sustainable living and care for the earth; to integration of mind and heart, Mission and Ministry strives to embody and advance the University's Catholic and Augustinian identity.

The Catholic Mass provides a space where people from all backgrounds can gather to listen to the Word of God and celebrate the Eucharist. Large liturgies are held during special occasions such as New Student Orientation, Family Weekend and Commencement. Masses are also available on Sundays, including Misa en Español (Spanish Mass), and weekdays at St. Thomas of Villanova Church and Corr Chapel. Throughout the week, liturgical services like the Sacrament of Reconciliation and Adoration are also offered.

EXPLORING

Villanova's mission statement stresses the development of the total person: intellectually, emotionally, spiritually, culturally, socially and physically. This view reflects our Augustinian focus on both heart and mind, on both individual and community. Villanova provides many opportunities for students to get involved in co-curricular activities, all of which enrich campus life and students' own development.

CLUBS, ORGANIZATIONS AND VOLUNTEER PROGRAMS

Villanova offers more than 250 student clubs and organizations, and Involvement Fairs are offered at the beginning of each Fall and Spring semester to give students a look at the opportunities available to them. Meetings, programming and events take place on both the Villanova and Cabrini campuses. There is something for everyone! Trying something new and being active in the community outside of the classroom gives students the opportunity to learn valuable communication, time management and leadership skills. Participating in co-curricular activities connects students with new friends and helps to build a great résumé!

STUDENT LIFE UNITAS: OFFICE OF BELONGING AND INCLUSION

The Office of Belonging and Inclusion (OBI) commits to improving the experiences of all students on campus through programming and initiatives to cultivate a community of respect and inclusion. OFFICE OF FRATERNITY AND SORORITY LIFE

Approximately 40% of the undergraduate population is part of the fraternity and sorority community at Villanova. These organizations foster a strong sense of brotherhood and sisterhood among their members, creating lifelong bonds and connections. Recruitment and intake processes are available to students in the second semester of their first year. The Office of Fraternity and Sorority Life (OFSL) offers community-wide programming to support education and engagement within these organizations.

Parents and families should be aware that some fraternities are not recognized by Villanova University and/or national fraternal organizations, and that official new member activities do not take place in the first semester of a student's first year. Visit villanova.edu/fsl to learn more.

FITNESS FACILITIES

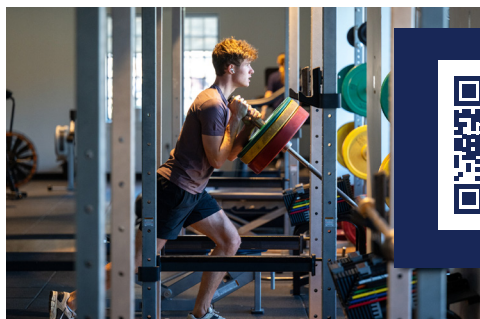
Villanovans have access to a wealth of fitness options across both campuses, with offerings including classes, personal training, weights, cardio equipment and more. On the Villanova Campus, students can visit the Davis Center for Athletics and Fitness, located near the Finneran Pavilion, or fitness centers in Farley, Stanford and McGuinn residence halls. A group fitness studio is also available in Canon residence hall. Students can also take advantage of facilities like Jake Nevin Field House; swim and soccer complexes; an outdoor running track; outdoor basketball, tennis and pickleball courts; a sand volleyball court; and gymnasiums in the St. Mary's and Alumni residence halls.

On the Cabrini Campus, the 100,000-square-foot, two-story Dixon Center and Nerney Pavilion offers weights, cardio equipment and group fitness spaces, as well as three indoor basketball courts, an indoor pool and a suspended running track. Outside, students can use basketball, tennis and pickleball courts, grass and turf fields, and a walking trail.

No matter where they live, Villanovans will have full access to facilities on both campuses. Shuttle service will be provided between both campuses.

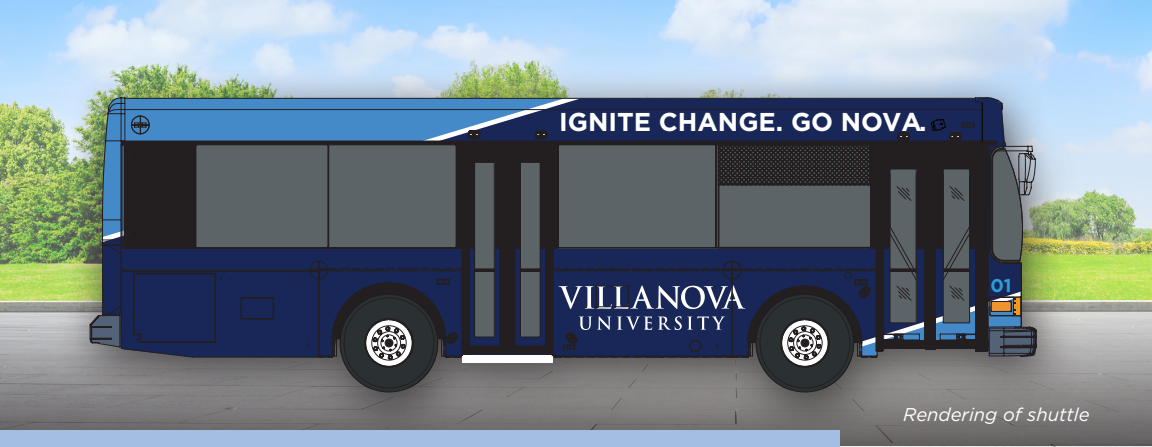
CLUB SPORTS AND INTRAMURALS

Villanova's Office of Fitness and Recreation offers a number of athletic activities for students with varying levels of experience, interest and commitment. Club sports provide Villanovans who are still passionate about their sport with a higher level of competition without a Division I level of commitment. Intramural sports offer a fun, safe environment in which students can compete in a team setting against other Villanovans. Villanova offers 30 club sports and at least 10 intramural leagues and tournaments each year!

GETTING AROUND

Villanova provides a safe, reliable and convenient transportation system that operates between the Villanova and Cabrini campuses, and throughout the local area.

CAMPUS SHUTTLE

A fleet of shuttle buses operates all day along two separate routes between the Villanova and Cabrini campuses, ensuring easy and direct travel for students. During core class hours, free roundtrip shuttles arrive at stops on both campuses every five minutes. During the early mornings and on weekends, roundtrip shuttles arrive at stops on both campuses every 10 minutes. Each shuttle stop has a transportation coordinator on site to ensure efficient system operation and support timely arrivals and departures.

From 10:30 p.m. to 6:30 a.m., students at any Villanova location can use the free Nova Van On Demand for service on or between campuses. Students utilizing this system must present their Wildcard to the driver upon boarding.

Express shuttle services operate on the Villanova Campus beginning at 7:30 a.m. Students can catch rides to and from locations around campus—for example, from their residence hall on South Campus to an early-morning class in an academic building in the center of campus.

TRIPSHOT APP

Villanova uses the TripShot app, available in the App Store or Google Play, which provides real-time bus tracking and up-to-date information about bus stops and schedules, and allows you to request a ride with the Nova Van on Demand or Mobility Shuttle. The app also provides information about schedules and routes for all other on- and off-campus shuttles.

TRAVELING OFF CAMPUS

Students wishing to travel off campus to locations like Bryn Mawr, Rosemont and King of Prussia can utilize the free off-campus shuttle, which includes morning and evening express services. This shuttle is helpful for students wishing to visit retail locations like the King of Prussia Mall and local grocery and convenience stores, or who need to travel to Bryn Mawr Hospital for doctor’s visits.

For longer trips, students can utilize the area’s excellent public transportation system, which includes a regional rail line to Philadelphia (helpful when attending Wildcat basketball games at Xfinity Mobile Arena!). Discounted student passes and tickets can be purchased at the Office of Student Involvement in Dougherty Hall.

Villanova offers Zipcar rentals on both the Villanova and Cabrini campuses for students to use for errands or to visit places not serviced by public transportation. Ride-share services and taxi companies are also available in the local area and may pick up riders at designated areas on both campuses. (Taxi and rideshare drivers are not permitted to access interior areas of either campus.)

And when students are ready to head home for breaks or summer, Philadelphia International Airport is located just 20 miles from Villanova. Student organizations will often raise funds for their groups by offering low-cost shuttle services to the airport.





STUDENT HEALTH CENTER

The Student Health Center on the Villanova Campus is open 24/7 when classes are in session and offers online weekday self-scheduling. The Health Center operates very similar to a primary care provider that your Villanovan uses while at home. Just as you would expect from your primary care

provider, our staff of physicians—who are also affiliated with local hospitals—nurse practitioners, RNs and other professionals are equipped to handle many medical conditions and refer more serious issues either to specialists in the area or to local hospitals. In addition to having excellent training, these professionals also have a lot of experience dealing with the health problems associated with college-age students.

Students on either campus who need to get to the Student Health Center should call Public Safety to arrange transportation. In an emergency, ambulances will respond to either campus and facilitate transportation to a local hospital.

UNIVERSITY COUNSELING CENTER

The Patricia B. and Gary M. Holloway University Counseling Center provides confidential counseling and psychological services free of charge to students who are currently enrolled in classes on campus. The student may schedule an appointment to discuss normal developmental concerns such as homesickness, relationship issues, managing emotions and clarifying personal values. The student may also seek help with anxiety, panic disorder, depression, eating disorders, drug and alcohol use, loss of a loved one, trauma, sexual assault and any other concern. Telehealth appointments are available for clients who are physically located in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as required under Pennsylvania law. Villanova also partners with **Uwill**, a leading mental health

platform for colleges and universities, which allows students to connect quickly and at no cost with licensed mental health counselors based on their unique needs and preferences, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

OFFICE OF HEALTH PROMOTION

The Office of Health Promotion provides resources and services to help students thrive, not just survive, during their college years. Topics commonly discussed with Health Promotion staff and in programs led by student leaders include nutrition, fitness, sleep, stress, alcohol and other substances, sexual health and sexual violence. Students can access Health Promotion's 24/7, confidential THRIVE 365 online portal for Villanova resources and services, as well as an ever-evolving library of information on health and well-being that adapts to them the more they use it. Students can also download the Flourish mobile app to set up prompts and small challenges to support their well-being.

STAYING HEALTHY AND SAFE

Villanova provides many opportunities for students to learn more about how to prevent illness and how to have a happy and healthy collegiate experience. However, they are bound to get sick or stressed now and again, especially if they “burn the candle at both ends.” We know that when our students are stressed, they are also likely to become ill more easily and frequently. As a caretaker, it is natural to worry about your Villanovan’s health, but you should know that they are in good hands.

WHAT CAN THE UNIVERSITY TELL ME ABOUT MY VILLANOVAN’S HEALTH AND WELL-BEING?

Under federal HIPAA and FERPA laws, students over the age of 18 are legally considered adults and have the right to medical privacy. Your Villanovan will have the option to sign a waiver allowing family members access to health information. If your child requires hospitalization, you will receive a call from the University.



EMERGENCIES

Villanova's Department of Public Safety coordinates emergency responses on both the Villanova and Cabrini campuses. This response may include first responder teams from local communities and townships, as well as Villanova Emergency Medical Service (VEMS), a 24-hour emergency service made up of students who are trained EMT staff. We also have access to on-call paramedics who can be on campus within minutes to deal with more serious issues, and Bryn Mawr Hospital is a short distance away.

DOES MY CHILD NEED HEALTH INSURANCE?

All undergraduate students are required to have health insurance; visit villanova.edu/shc for details, important deadlines and information on the University's health insurance plan (if needed). Your Villanovan should bring a copy of their health insurance card to campus. Your health insurance plan can tell you more about what kinds of services are included in your plan.

ALCOHOL AND OTHER SUBSTANCES

Pennsylvania state law and Villanova's policies forbid the purchase, possession, consumption or transportation of alcohol by anyone under 21 years old.

Your Villanovan will confront choices about alcohol and other substances while in college. You want them to make wise choices, and so do we. Sometimes a poor choice can impact a student's life long after the party is over. Remember, excessive drinking and substance use are not the norm, and students have a good time at Villanova without them. Talk with your Villanovan about choices and the consequences of their actions. The conversations you have will strongly impact the decisions they make while away at college and lead them to healthier choices.

SEXUAL VIOLENCE PREVENTION AND RESPONSE

Every community member shares the responsibility of creating and maintaining an environment that promotes healthy, respectful and safe relationships. While the University has resources and strong policies in place to help prevent and address violations of these community standards, we are also looking to partner with families in these efforts.

Before and upon arrival to campus, and throughout the next four years, your Villanovan will have opportunities to engage in conversations about respect, consent and boundaries. However, it is crucial for families to initiate these conversations before students arrive.

Later this summer, you'll receive our *Guide to Health and Well-Being*, a comprehensive listing of the health services provided to students at Villanova.

NAVIGATING NECESSITIES

BILLING

The Office of the Bursar is responsible for assessing charges to student accounts. Bills, or **V-Bills**, can be viewed through the MyNova student portal or via the link at bursar.villanova.edu. The billing system is live, and changes to your account are viewable immediately. It is strongly encouraged that your student add you to their V-Bill account as an “Authorized User.” You will then receive email notifications and be able to view and pay charges on their account.

Information from the Office of Financial Assistance, including deadline reminders, is sent directly to the student’s Villanova email address after the student enrolls at Villanova.

Both offices occasionally send official notifications to students via email. An email notifying the student that the aid package is complete will be sent to the student, and the student can then view their financial aid in MyNova. It’s important that you communicate with your Villanovan to make sure they share this information with you.

WHEN WILL I RECEIVE TUITION BILLS?

Fall semester bills are issued in July; spring semester bills are issued in November; and summer semester bills are issued in April. Once your Villanovan registers you as an “Authorized User,” you will receive V-Bill email notifications.



THE WILDCARD

The **Wildcard**, Villanova’s official identification card, is your Villanovan’s key to the University. Students will submit individual photos to the Wildcard Office by early July in order to receive their Wildcards when they check into their residence hall on Move-In Day. Commuter students will receive their Wildcards during Orientation.

The Wildcard gives students access to their residence hall, meal plan and meal points, the library and athletic events.

The Wildcard also accesses your Villanovan’s **Nova Bucks** account. Nova Bucks is a restricted debit account that allows students to enjoy purchasing power across campus and in the surrounding community without carrying cash or credit cards. Students can also use their Nova Bucks to buy merchandise in the Villanova University Shop and will receive a 5% discount on the total purchase.

OTHER EXPENSES

We encourage you to have an open and consistent dialogue with your Villanovan regarding expenses that come up during their time on campus. The costs of school supplies, activities, entertainment, ride sharing and meal delivery services can add up quickly, and it’s important to have a plan to cover these expenses.

Through the **Villanova Textbook Access Program**, a fee charged directly to your Villanovan’s account at the start of the semester will cover all textbook materials required for their courses. Students have the opportunity to opt out of the program each semester. To learn more, visit villanova.edu/textbook-access.

The **Nova Nook** in Dougherty Hall is stocked with a wide variety of basic toiletries and food items to assist students who may struggle to manage these costs on their own. Visit villanova.edu/novanook to learn more.

WORKING

Many students find jobs on campus through work-study programs and on-campus student job fairs, held throughout the year. Your Villanovan can also visit jobs.villanova.edu for a list of available on-campus jobs.



TECH NEEDS

University Technology Services supports students with the technology they use every day, from accessing their Wildcard and campus Wi-Fi to using the learning management system. Students can also reserve collaboration spaces and get walk-up help with personal laptops and devices at Tech Zone locations on the Villanova and Cabrini campuses.
